147 SCHOOLS AND COMMUNITY GROUPS served by Kaiser Permanente's award-winning Educational Theatre Program, in partnership with Oregon Children's Theatre. Teaching artists engaged 22,800 students and 2,200 staff through workshops and performances, empowering them to improve their physical, mental, and emotional health. [LEARN MORE](#)



3,117 VOLUNTEERS AND 7,990 HOURS were dedicated to community service and volunteerism efforts by Kaiser Permanente employees over the course of the year. Among the many services they provided, our employees painted schools, served meals to the hungry, built homes, delivered groceries to seniors and people with disabilities, and served as board members for non-profit organizations. CHRONIC DISEASE PREVENTION & TREATMENT



75 RECIPIENTS were provided with legal assistance through the Medical-Legal Partnership project with Metropolitan Public Defender, helping them to retain/sustain housing. The project serves people by co-locating a lawyer in 3 clinics in central and east Portland to address important social needs that impact health.



5 COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS AND 2 EDUCATION SERVICE DISTRICTS partnered with Kaiser Permanente and 36 local schools across 15 school districts to reduce systemic barriers to regular school attendance from Pre-K through High School. [LEARN MORE](#)



186 STUDENTS received scholarships totaling \$605,000 through Kaiser Permanente's Health Care Career Scholarship program and our partnership with Portland State University's Ignite program. These programs provide social, career, and academic support to disadvantaged students from the community, enabling them to successfully enter college and pursue health care professions. 382 TOTAL HOUSING UNITS developed through a joint collaboration with 4 other health systems and the nonprofit Central City Concern.
